A Message from Chief Law Enforcement Officer Lieutenant Dan Kranz:

2025 was an incredibly unique and transformative year for the Fanwood Police Department. It was a year defined by profound loss, personnel transitions, large-scale investigations, and as always, the continued commitment to the safety of our community. As I reflect on both the challenges we faced and the milestones we achieved, I remain in awe of the resilience of our officers and the continued support of the people we serve. I want to start by saying **thank you**.

The heart of our department was tested this year as we mourned the passing of Officer Carlos Gonzalez Jr. following his courageous battle with lymphoma. Carlos was more than a colleague; he was a brother to us all. In the wake of this tragedy, the entire department came together to honor his life and support his family. Through the resolve of our officers and the tremendous support from law enforcement agencies, government officials, and the Fanwood community, we were able to provide Officer Gonzalez with the dignified memorial he truly deserved. His legacy of service continues to guide this department.

This year also marked the conclusion of two distinguished careers with the retirement of Sergeant Kevin Stomber and Officer Kathleen Case. While their departures created a significant void in institutional knowledge and experience, we thank them for their years of dedicated service and wish them nothing but the best in their well-earned retirements!

We were also proud to welcome three new officers to our ranks: Tim Tagaev, Jeffrey Yosurack, and Eric Cartagena. Each brings valuable experience from prior law enforcement agencies, and their diverse backgrounds have already proven to be a strong asset to both the department and the Borough.

Additionally, we extend our congratulations to our partners at the Scotch Plains Police Department. We congratulate Chief Jeffrey Briel on his retirement and look forward to working closely with Captain David Lavery, soon to be Chief, and the rest of Scotch Plains PD. Our continued inter-agency collaboration remains a critical factor in maintaining overall safety and low crime rates in both communities.

In an era of tightening budgets, the Fanwood Police Department has mastered the art of doing more with less. I will say, in fact, that we have been doing “the most with the least.” Even with our reduced staffing, we successfully secured grant funding to place additional officers on the road to enforce pedestrian safety laws and deter impaired driving. We also leveraged our law enforcement partnerships to obtain heavy ballistic vests from the FBI Newark Office and tactical medical equipment from the National Sheriffs’ Association at no cost to the Borough. We continue to pursue equipment, training, and resources that minimize financial impact on taxpayers.

Our 2025 statistics reflect a department that is more active than ever. Call volume increased by 13% compared to last year, yet despite this double-digit rise in calls for service and police responsibility, there were no gaps in response times.

Motor vehicle stops increased by 32%, motor vehicle summonses rose by more than 200%, impoundments of illegally operated vehicles increased by 24%, and arrests were up 10%. These figures reflect a proactive approach to traffic safety and quality-of-life enforcement throughout the Borough.

Our commitment to public safety extends beyond enforcement. We continue to prioritize school safety and traffic flow, working closely with the Borough Engineer and other stakeholders. This year, several ordinances were updated to clarify parking regulations, enhance public safety, and allow the Department of Public Works to more effectively clear roadways during inclement weather.

Equally important is our commitment to community policing. Our officers take great pride in building relationships with residents outside of enforcement settings. Throughout the year, members of the department actively participated in community events such as Fan Jam, speaking with trick-or-treaters on Helen Street, hanging out with the Easter bunny at the Easter Egg Hunt, and many other events and activities. These events allow our officers to engage with residents in a positive and informal way, strengthen trust, and reinforce the idea that we are not just policing the community...we are part of it!

Lastly, we continue to embrace the digital age to keep residents informed. Our social media presence continues to grow and will expand further in 2026. Facebook followers increased by 11%, Instagram by 124%, and Everbridge alert subscriptions by 7%. Our goal is to ensure residents receive timely, accurate information regarding road closures, police activity, and important Borough updates, and we will continue encouraging residents to follow our platforms and sign up for alerts.

In closing, I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to the Fanwood community. Every day, we are guided by the responsibility of keeping you, your families, your businesses, and your neighborhoods safe. While new challenges inevitably arise, we remain committed to meeting them head-on so Fanwood continues to be a safe and pleasant place to live and work.

Thank you Fanwood. We are here for you.

End of Year Note from Traffic Unit Supervisor Sergeant Daniel Piccola:

The Fanwood Police Traffic Unit handled a wide range of important responsibilities throughout the year to improve roadway safety and traffic flow in the Borough. Along with all the other officers of the Fanwood Police Department, the unit focused on enforcing traffic laws, protecting pedestrians, and reducing congestion in busy areas. Through enforcement, planning, and community involvement, the Traffic Unit played a key role in keeping Fanwood's roads safe and efficient:

Grants: The unit assisted with applying for several statewide grants including the NJ Division of Highway Traffic Safety "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" Program. The Traffic Unit also helped secure a year-long Pedestrian Safety Grant, which focused on enforcement near schools, school crossing guards, crosswalks and other high-pedestrian traffic areas. These initiatives proved successful in enforcement and, more importantly, educating motorists and pedestrians about traffic and pedestrian laws they may not have fully understood.

School-Zone Enforcement: Fanwood officers issued almost 700 summonses and warnings for violations in these high-pedestrian traffic areas with violations including speeding, careless driving, delaying traffic by blocking intersections, and disregarding school crossing guards. These 700 violations account for only a portion of the nearly 2,500 summonses issued in 2025 by Fanwood officers. These enforcement efforts helped reduce speeding and encouraged safer driving behavior.

Traffic Studies: The Traffic Unit also worked closely with the Union County Bureau of Traffic Safety and Maintenance to conduct several speed and traffic studies on borough and county-owned roadways. These studies allowed the unit to better understand traffic patterns and problem areas, to help combat traffic and congestion by identifying where changes are needed and improve safety.

Special Event Planning: The Traffic unit was responsible for creating Incident Action Plans (IAP) for all borough events. These IAPs detail the objectives of the events, provided traffic control strategies, tactics, and organized resources. The unit coordinated with the Fanwood Department of Public

Works, led by Director Clinton Dickson and Foreman John Piccola, for these resources to ensure the safety of attendees and smooth vehicle flow before, during, and after the events.

Investigations: The Traffic Unit also investigated several hit-and-run crashes to hold drivers accountable and provide answers to victims.

Mitigating Congestion: Student safety is a top priority for the Traffic Unit and the Fanwood Police as a whole, especially around school zones. The Traffic Unit and Fanwood officers managed traffic during school arrival and dismissal times to reduce congestion and prevent crashes. Fanwood, like many municipalities throughout New Jersey, has experienced a significant increase in vehicular traffic due to the construction of new housing. This rise in traffic has created challenges in keeping residents, visitors, and pedestrians safe, particularly in and around school zones. With more people comes more vehicles and limited space to accommodate them. Despite these challenges, the Traffic Unit and Fanwood officers worked diligently, and continue to do so, to manage the congestion, maintain safety, and keep traffic moving efficiently throughout the Borough.

Crossing Guard Administration: The Traffic Unit also ensured that their crossing guards received continuous training throughout the year. The unit recognizes the eight crossing guards, Connie Peterson, Alan Krey, Robert Krowicki, Jack Ross, Steve Smith, Erin Bulger, Mary Cosgrove, and Margit Hansen, for their outstanding dedication. Many of these individuals are retired and continue to serve the community with professionalism and reliability. This commitment is even clearer during inclement weather, when they continue to perform their duties despite rain, snow, cold, or extreme heat. We are incredibly appreciative of their reliability, hard work, and continued commitment to the safety of Fanwood.

Borough Ordinance Adoption: The Traffic Unit proposed new borough ordinances, such as additional no-parking zones near schools, to improve visibility and reduce traffic backups. The unit has also proposed long-term safety improvements, including lowering speed limits on certain roadways.

Road Maintenance: Finally, the Traffic Unit worked to maintain and improve traffic infrastructure across the Borough. Officers quickly reported potholes to the proper authorities which reduced potential damage to vehicles. Traffic lights were monitored to ensure they worked properly, and repairs were coordinated when needed. The unit and Fanwood officers assisted in several funeral escorts and prepared traffic control plans for longer processions, coordinating with surrounding jurisdictions.

Goals for 2026: The Traffic Unit is already planning a collaboration with the Scotch Plains Police Department and EZ Ride of New Jersey, a non-profit organization that works directly with government agencies to help them implement pedestrian and bicycle safety programs throughout New Jersey. Together, we aim to provide in-person presentations in all Scotch Plains-Fanwood schools to educate students and parents about electric bicycle safety, proper usage, and applicable laws.

Through these many duties, the Traffic Unit remains an essential part of public safety in Fanwood.

End of Year Note from Investigations Division Supervisor Lieutenant Ryan Gilmore:

In 2025, the Fanwood Detective Bureau was comprised of a Detective Lieutenant and one Detective Sergeant. Together, they are dedicated to investigating crimes with integrity and diligence to ensure the successful prosecution of individuals who threaten the safety of Fanwood Borough and its residents, businesses, and visitors.

- The Detective Bureau was called into service 22 times outside of regular scheduled hours.
- The Bureau investigated, reviewed, and engaged crime victims, witnesses, and accused individuals in connection with the cases detailed in the 2025 statistical chart.
- Issued dozens of subpoenas and preservation requests.
- Applied for various search warrants to further investigations.
- Completed extensive background investigations of police candidates, Borough employees, and volunteers for local emergency services.

Arrests and Charges: Various individuals were arrested or issued criminal complaints for charges including, but not limited to: Murder, Arson, Burglary, Aggravated Assault, Terroristic Threats, various Domestic Violence crimes, various Disorderly Person’s Offenses, and more.

Significant Cases

Below are a few examples of the excellent investigative work carried out by the Fanwood Police Department Detective Bureau:

January: Fanwood officers received complaints from a LaGrande Avenue resident reporting that a neighbor was harassing her through various means. The Detective Bureau conducted a follow-up investigation and subsequently charged the actor with Harassment in violation of N.J.S.A. 2C:33-4.

June: Officers took a report from a juvenile female who stated she was being harassed and threatened by a male juvenile. The report was forwarded to the Detective Bureau for further investigation. Through digital investigative methods and interviews with the involved parties, the following juvenile charges were approved, one count of Terroristic Threats, a third-degree offense (N.J.S.A. 2C:12-3(a)); one count of Cyber Harassment, a fourth-degree offense (N.J.S.A. 2C:33-4.1(a)(3)); one count of Harassment, a petty disorderly persons offense (N.J.S.A. 2C:33-4); and one count of Simple Assault, a disorderly persons offense (N.J.S.A. 2C:12-1(a)(1)).

July: On December 10, 2025, after a lengthy investigation involving the Fanwood Police Department, Union County Prosecutor's Office, and various county, state, and federal agencies, a Fanwood man was arrested and charged with setting a fatal house fire that took place on July 25, 2025, on Kempshall Terrace. Charges include first-degree murder, first-degree felony murder, first-degree burglary, and second-degree aggravated arson.

August: Patrol officers took a report alleged domestic stalking. Detectives utilized various investigative methods to further the investigation, and were able to charge the suspect with Stalking, a fourth-degree offense in violation of N.J.S.A. 2C:12-10(b). The individual was subsequently arrested and lodged in the County Jail.

October: Following a report of a past-occurred assault and harassment, detectives charged the suspect with one count of Simple Assault 2C:12-1(a)(1) and one count of Harassment 2C:33-4(a).

November: Officers responded to a report of a motor vehicle collision in which there were multiple victims with injuries. The Detective Bureau responded immediately and assumed control of the investigation. The Union County Crash Reconstruction Team and the Union County Sheriff's Office Crime Scene Unit responded as well to assist, and notification was made to the Union County Prosecutor's Office. Fanwood detectives successfully were granted various search warrants related to the case.

The Fanwood Detective Bureau remains committed to serving the community through thorough investigations, collaboration with law enforcement partners, and dedication to justice. Their work in 2025 highlights their effectiveness in solving crimes and maintaining the safety and well-being of Fanwood Borough.

Additional Notes: Social Media Outreach

- 2025 saw a push to gain more attraction to our social media accounts. This was primarily accomplished through a campaign to bring awareness to our various accounts. We also increased the amount of time-sensitive alerts that were broadcasted to include weather events, road closures, and police activity. This will continue into 2026.
- **Facebook:** Facebook saw an 11% increase in followers from 2024. 59% of Facebook followers are between the ages of 45-70, while only 12% of followers are between the ages of 18-34. We will create content and alerts to cater to these demographics.
- **Instagram:** Instagram saw a 124% increase in followers from 2024. This was accomplished through a variety of time-sensitive alerts. We have also specifically marketed our Instagram to include community policing information, photos of vintage Fanwood Police events, and other visually appealing content to engage our audience.
- **Everbridge:** Subscribers increased by 7% over the year by advertising the system at various in-person events as well as online. Over 10,000 phone numbers and email addresses get alerts related to Fanwood news, and we expect this number to only increase into 2026.

Additional Goals and Objectives for 2026

Recruitment, Retention, and Staffing

- Increase the sworn staff to be consistent with necessary staffing levels, as well as State and Federal staffing standards. Copies of recent staffing memorandums can be furnished upon request.
- Hold hiring processes for a Special Law Enforcement Officer Class 2, and a Special Law Enforcement Officer Class 3 position in coordination with the Board of Education and LaGrande School (opening Fall 2026).
- Continue internship programs for both High School and College students.

Operations

- Increase proactive patrols and traffic enforcement in problem areas and streets.
- Partner with neighboring agencies on crime prevention and mutual aide agreements.

Social Media, Communications, & Community Outreach

- Continue providing transparent communications with the Fanwood community through social media, text alerts, and other avenues.
- Utilize interactive media (video, photo, etc.) to promote new programs, and spread awareness on current policies, initiatives, etc.
- Continue current community policing initiatives and develop new events.
- Ensure that the Borough has proper equipment and location(s) to hold news conferences.

Emergency Management

- Continue to hold training and exercises with local partners to prepare for a variety of potential incidents.
- Continue training sworn personnel toward advanced FEMA/ICS certifications.

Training and Professional Development

- Continue to certify officers in CIT, FTO, and other disciplines.
- Increase leadership development in current and future leaders.
- Crosstrain officers in traffic-related certifications, workplace safety, and other related topics.
- Send applicable officers to FEMA classes regarding bombs and explosives, radiation detection, and other nationwide training opportunities.
